Michael Cavanagh

CHAIRMAN

This past quadrennial has probably been one of the most exciting in our 80 year history and I feel privileged to have been Chairman during this time.

It started immediately following Scotland's successful bid to host the Commonwealth Games in Glasgow in 2014. That achievement resulted in great excitement and anticipation across the whole of Scottish sport and indeed the whole country. It has also been a significant but exciting challenge for our Board and professional staff, in terms of how we can contribute effectively to many of the key activities of the Organising Committee (OC), to ensure it delivers on its commitment to host a sport focused, athlete centred Games which reflects our original vision. This desire for a strong working relationship with the OC has had to be balanced with the need to retain our own focus on selecting, preparing and managing our teams in 2008, 2010 and now for 2011 and 2014 when we plan to have our biggest and most successful team ever.

We have worked hard to ensure that the Commonwealth Games voice is heard and seen at the top of Government and we now have regular meetings with the First Minister, Sports Minister and others in Government, and have ensured sport is now high up the agenda in these pressured economic times. We are particularly proud that, by working closely with **sportscotland**, we were able to make the case for additional preparation resources for sports in the 2014 Games. This resulted in an additional £3.5 million, now being distributed via **sportscotland** since 2009 for performance outcomes relating to the Games in Glasgow.

Pune 2008 saw the Commonwealth Youth Games expand significantly to include all 71 nations, making the competition stiffer and medals harder to come by. Our team performed well and we won 3 Gold, 3 Silver and 12 Bronze to finish 8th on the medal table which was no mean feat with only 44 competitors. It was however an even greater success delivering on its core purpose as a development opportunity, with a number of competitors going on

to compete and win medals in Delhi, an impressive achievement. Pune also gave us a taste of the organisational challenges that would lie ahead two years later in and helped shape our preparations. Thanks to our team staff, led by Lisa Allan, and congratulations to all involved.



As anticipated, Delhi proved to be a spectacular Games in an amazing country. However there were also a number of difficult challenges, in a cultural and competition environment that few members of Team Scotland had previously experienced. Despite many warnings, preparations for the Games by the Organising Committee had fallen behind schedule to a point where the participation of athletes, including those from Team Scotland, was in question and the Games themselves may have been in jeopardy. After frantic last minute activity by the hosts, the Games got underway and our team responded magnificently and delivered as one united team, despite the most trying of Games circumstances that I or many others have been involved in. Scotland had its second most successful Games ever, winning 9 Gold, 10 Silver and 7 Bronze, a total of 26 medals. Shooting was the top sport with Swimming not far behind. It was also a landmark moment when we heard Flower of Scotland played for the first time ever to celebrate our first Gold medal of the Games won by Robbie Renwick in the pool.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our sports and athletes who trusted in the advice being given, and to all the Board and team management who worked tirelessly, often above and beyond what could be reasonably expected. I am proud to have led and spoken for CGS over this period. Both in Delhi and Scotland we all projected a consistent message about what needed to be done to ensure our team could perform at the Games. Our athletes, staff and partners stayed with us reflecting the fantastic pre-Games work we had done and the strong relationship built amongst us. I would also like to thank our public and commercial partners,

who supported us throughout the last four years and stood shoulder to shoulder with us in 2010 when we needed it most. In particular many thanks to **sportscotland**, Clydesdale Bank, Emirates Airline and the Leadership Trust and our 2014 Games partners in the Scottish Government, Glasgow City Council and Glasgow 2014 Ltd.

For Delhi we also introduced the Achieve 2014 programme led by Graeme Randall and his team. Early indications are it was a huge success and we are now looking to see how we can further develop this programme in Glasgow and we look forward to a number of the athletes and coaches 'graduating' to the full Games team in 2014.

With the ink barely dry on our Delhi debrief, we recruited our management staff to lead Youth Team Scotland, at the next Commonwealth Youth Games in the Isle of Man in September 2011, with our office back in full Games preparation mode. No doubt the Isle of Man 2011 will give us a glimpse of some new faces we will see in Glasgow in 2014.

Team Scotland is truly a team in its widest sense and is the culmination of the efforts of a large number of people and organisations, who have worked tirelessly over many years to prepare the athletes, from their start in local clubs, through to international representation for their country in their chosen sport. I would like to thank all our 26 member sports for their support and commitment to the continuing success of Team Scotland, on the exciting journey towards a home Games in Glasgow. We must continue to work together if we are to deliver our biggest and most successful team ever in 2014 and at the same time, develop a team performance structure that will consistently deliver for many Games to come. Whilst we have benefited financially through the Joint Marketing Agreement with the Glasgow 2014 Organising Committee, we must ensure in these difficult economic times that the money is used wisely and for the long-term benefit of Team Scotland.

With the magnificent Scottish section of the Delhi 2010 Closing Ceremony giving a taste of things to come, we now look ahead to Glasgow 2014 with confidence. Commonwealth Games Scotland will be the host Commonwealth Games Association and we are extremely excited about the prospect

of welcoming our counterparts from across the Commonwealth to our proud nation and to Glasgow, a special city that is so passionate about sport. CGS is determined to help deliver a sport focused, athlete centred Games and one that puts the fun and friendship back at the heart of this special sport and cultural gathering that is so important to our country – the only time that Scotland gets to compete in a multi-sport Games as a nation in its own right.

I am proud that not only have we delivered successful teams in 2008 and 2010 and have made a significant input into the development of Glasgow 2014 Ltd., but we have initiated innovative programmes such as Achieve 2014, Commonwealth Championship support programmes, assistance for sports to attend Delhi prior to the 2010 Games and a ground breaking medallists reward scheme. All of these programmes complement existing funding streams for sport from Government, Lottery and corporate partners.

I am proud to have led a Board which, has worked hard to develop our long-term strategic plan, our structures, finances and wider relationships to a point where CGS is widely regarded as a leading Games Association by our peers and partners. This will assist us not only deliver in 2011 and 2014, but allows us to be well positioned in these tight and uncertain economic times in preparing for the Youth Games that follow quickly after, in 2015 and 2017, and the next Commonwealth Games in 2018.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my first term in office, working with a committed Board, and a dedicated staff. It has been challenging, demanding and exciting, with our profile and reputation as an organisation going from strength to strength. Greater challenges lie ahead, however I believe we have made great progress in preparing for the next four years and are ready to capitalise on the excitement and opportunity of a home Games. To each and every one of you who supported me and the Board, our staff and Team Scotland - thank you.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE

Overview

This report summarises achievements, activities, issues and observations relating to the Games Council's strategic plan and operations over the last quadrennial.

The period 2007-2011 has continued to see massive changes in the wider environment in which Commonwealth Games Scotland, our member sports, team members and supporters have had to operate.

This period has seen the culmination of activity relating to the 2008 Commonwealth Youth Games in Pune, India and the 2010 Commonwealth Games in Delhi, India. In addition, the early part saw the final preparations and winning of the Glasgow 2014 Commonwealth Games Bid, and subsequently the establishment of the Glasgow 2014 Games operating company and its plans and programmes, along with development of wider legacy programmes. Post Delhi we have seen the development of planning and final preparations for the 2011 Youth Games in the Isle of Man and planning for Team Scotland success at the 2014 Games in Glasgow accelerate.

Activity and Achievements

In summary:

Team Preparation and Organisation

- Preparations for the third Commonwealth Youth Games in Pune, India in 2008 intensified in 2007 and 2008 with the Games held in 2008 with organisation that was to become a portent for that in 2010. As such this was a great learning opportunity for both athletes and staff that we had planned it to be.
- Key staff for Pune 2008 were selected and prepared in accordance with policies and plans and acquitted themselves well in difficult circumstances under the leadership of General Team Manager Lisa Allan.
- A similar staff appointment programme has operated for the Isle of Man Commonwealth



Youth Games in 2011 with all key staff appointed by early 2011 under the leadership of General Team Manager Vicky Strange.

- Delhi 2010 staff were selected either by open recruitment or on secondment basis with regular staff training, and a number of site visits by management staff from 2007 through to 2010. This team was led by Jon Doig as Chef De Mission. Support from the Leadership Trust meant all management staff received additional leadership training support.
- Additional funding was available for all sports, to assist with pre-Games travel to visit Delhi before the Games to prepare as required. Emirates acted as team carrier and did a superb job particularly when plans needed to be changed due to conditions in Delhi.
- Full Team Camps for both the Youth Games and Commonwealth Games team were held prior to departure for all selected athletes and staff. These proved successfully at providing key information and were critical in developing team ethos and understanding.
- In extremely difficult and testing conditions for athletes and staff alike in Delhi, we achieved our second best ever Games result winning 9 Gold, 10 Silver and 7 Bronze medals in 7 of the 16 sports represented, with numerous other Scottish Records and personal bests. This exceeded our target of 16-25 medals.
- Melbourne Games star, Cyclist Ross Edgar who in 2006 became the first athlete to win a full set of medals at one Games, was selected by the athletes to carry the Saltire at the Opening Ceremony. Shooter Jonathan Hammond, who went one better winning double Gold as well as Silver and Bronze medals, was selected to carry it at the Closing Ceremony. He was accompanied by fellow shooter Jen McIntosh who won 2 Gold and 1 Bronze, swimmer David Carry who won a Silver and Bronze to go with his 2006 double

Gold and Silver medals, and long standing Games team physiotherapist and 2006/2010 Shooting Team Manager Joan Watt.

Administration

- A review of CGCS structure was completed in March 2011.
- A specialist multi-sport Games database, Zeus which was introduced, and used, prior to and during the Commonwealth Games in Melbourne was used once again for Delhi.
- Vicky Strange was appointed as our first Games Team Operations Manager in March 2009. Todd Cooper was appointed in January 2009 as Office Assistant leaving in January 2010 to join EventScotland. He was replaced by Catherine Goodfellow.
- An average of 10 Executive Board meetings were held each year with two meetings of Council.
- All company statutory returns were made as in accordance with our new company status. Commonwealth Games Scotland was used as our trading name from 2006 and Team Scotland for the Games teams from 2009.

Partnerships

- The Games Council has continued to work closely with both **sportscotland** and the Scottish Institute of Sport both before and after their operational merger. **sportscotland** and the Institute of Sport network provided staff support for both Youth Games and Commonwealth Games team preparations.
- The **sportscotland** medical support scheme successfully enhanced already committed funds in the high performance area. A joint strategy group to prepare for the 2010 Games with CGS, the Institute and **sportscotland** operated to co-ordinate and integrate preparation programmes. This has continued for Glasgow 2014, linked to a Mission 2014 programme established by **sportscotland** for each of the 17 sports on the Glasgow programme. A joint submission to the Scottish Government for additional resources targeted at the 2014 Games was successful and is being administered by **sportscotland**.
- CGS continues to play an active part at different Commonwealth Games Federation levels, with Louise Martin being re-elected

to her role as Hon CGF Secretary. There was close and ongoing contact with the CGF in relation to the Delhi 2010 Games and significantly, Glasgow 2014 Ltd. Commonwealth Games activity. In light of the challenging and difficult preparations in advance of the Delhi Games, a UK operations group with the other UK CGAs was established to discuss and address common operational issues and a similar information sharing group existed with Canada and New Zealand that was invaluable in preparing for and dealing with issues in Delhi.

- Already strong working relationships at Scottish Parliament and Government level developed further, particularly in the planning and delivery of the Glasgow 2014 Commonwealth Games Bid and in subsequent development and operation of the Glasgow 2014 Ltd. company. The First Minister has continued to chair the Strategic Planning Group and attended the 2010 Games along with the Sports Minister, who also attended the 2008 Commonwealth Youth Games in Pune. All MPs and MSPs were contacted in the context of information on Team members selected for the Games from their constituencies and with regard to the Glasgow 2014 Commonwealth Games bid. The Scottish Parliament Cross Party Group on Sport was also addressed twice.
- At local authority level, a strong partnership has developed with Glasgow City Council in context of the 2014 Commonwealth Games Bid and we also formed a strong relationship with many other local authorities. We especially highlight support from Glasgow, Edinburgh, Stirling and Borders for their help in hosting the Queen's Baton Relay.

Policies and Procedures

- Policies for the 2008, 2010 and 2011 Games in areas such as selection, anti-doping, team structure, clothing, flag bearer selection and team member agreements were all reviewed and appropriate changes made. An incident management plan was developed for Delhi. Selection standards for each Games were developed in conjunction with all sports based around a core CGS policy based on a top eight / top half equivalent, and all athletes for

2008 and 2010 were selected on time and in accordance with these policies.

- All data held for the 2010 Games has now been reviewed and any non-essential information removed.
- The national sports strategy 'Reaching Higher' identifies the Commonwealth Games as a key target area. CGS is identified as a key partner and we look forward to playing a central part in developing new action plans to support this.
- The CGF commenced its sports programme review post Delhi to which we have made a submission. The outcomes will be determined in November 2011 impacting primarily on the 2018 Games.

Finance

- The direct provision of grant aid for Games Council core operational costs by **sportscotland** has assisted with costs relating to the CGS office and staffing including the appointment of additional professional staff.
- The Scottish Commonwealth Games Endowment fund also enabled core operations to be underwritten for both the Youth Games and Commonwealth Games and specific activities such as Achieve 2014 and pre-Games Delhi acclimatisation to take place.
- Sponsorship, in particular from our major partners Clydesdale Bank and Emirates Airline, supported by suppliers such as Adidas and other competition kit suppliers including Medi UK, has provided the other necessary funds and in-kind support essential to prepare, outfit and transport the Team.
- Payment of the first two tranches in 2008 and 2010 of the Glasgow 2014 Joint Marketing payments have given further financial security in planning leading up to the Delhi and Glasgow Games and beyond, as we are planning activities and attendance at seven Games in the period 2008-2018 inclusive in a time of uncertain economic conditions and public finances. A further payment is scheduled for 2012.
- Financial operations have been managed by the CGS office through the Office Manager and Chief Executive, overseen by the Treasurer who directs investments in accordance with our financial procedures which have also been reviewed in 2011.

Marketing and Communications

- A complete review of our marketing activity took place in 2009 with the use of Commonwealth Games Scotland confirmed as our trading name and Team Scotland for our Team activity. Associated logos were redeveloped based around our Thistle device. With the strong Delhi results and Glasgow 2014 related activity, our 'Thistle' logo continues to get better known.
- In conjunction with our contracted support agency, Sporting Initiatives, a comprehensive media and communications plan for the 2008 and 2010 Games was developed and effectively delivered, enabling us not only to promote and communicate key messages about CGS, Team Scotland and partners but to deal with the attention of the world media prior and during the Delhi Games both in Scotland and in Delhi itself. The high media coverage prior to and at the Games again reflected the joint effort with the team members, sports and major partners and supporters to deliver it.
- Publications produced included seven Countdown newsletters and another very comprehensive Team Handbook.
- The CGS website has continued to be used as a major communication tool and was redeveloped in early 2011 to meet future needs and the growing interest in the Games. The Zeus system is integrated within it.
- Social media has become a key feature of our lives and a Twitter feed and regular written and video blogs became a key feature of our communication around the Delhi Games.
- We continued to work closely with the Scottish media prior to and during each Games. and have developed a strong photographic library of our activities and Games action. Particular tribute is paid to Steve Lindridge who sadly passed away in February 2011 is made, acknowledging his role in capturing the essence of what the Games means to our athletes and Scotland.

Promotions and Activities

- The Queen's Baton Relay visited Scotland in October 2009 and a comprehensive programme of activities and public engagement was organised. In addition, a

very enjoyable Thistle Club function for former team members was held in conjunction with the Baton's arrival in Glasgow.

- The CGS Annual Awards Dinner in Glasgow continues to go from strength to strength and provides a key opportunity to celebrate our Games success. From 2009 we have incorporated the Scottish Sports Aid Awards as part of this activity.
- Since 2003 the Games Council has awarded the Lonsdale Trophy for a Scottish Sports Person of the Year. This award was won by cyclist Chris (now Sir Chris) Hoy in 2007 and 2008, rower Katherine Grainger in 2009, and swimmer, Hannah Miley in 2010.
- In 2008 Scotland again hosted the Commonwealth Sports Awards with Sir Chris Hoy winning the Outstanding Male Athlete category.
- A number of individuals were identified for other national awards during this quadrennial period for their Games related activities. These included:
 - In 2009 Chris Hoy was awarded a Knighthood after his success at the 2008 Beijing Olympics.
 - Former Games Gold medal winning athletes Graeme Randall MBE and Richard Corsie were inducted into Scottish Sports Hall of Fame for sporting performances including those achieved at a Commonwealth Games. They join 17 other former Games athletes who were all previously inducted.
 - Team Scotland won the 2010 Sunday Mail Team of the Year award.
 - Clydesdale Bank sponsored Athlete of the Month Awards in the run up to the 2008 Pune Commonwealth Youth Games, culminating in an Athlete of the Games Award which went to swimmer Douglas Scott.
 - Clydesdale Bank also sponsored Athlete of the Month Awards in the run up to the 2010 Delhi Commonwealth Games culminating in both Male and Female Athlete of the Games Awards which went to shooters Jonathan Hammond and Jennifer McIntosh.
- In addition, swimmer Robbie Renwick was recognised with the Clydesdale Bank Inspirational Performance Award, whilst weightlifter Peter Kirkbride received the Most Memorable Moment of the Games Award.
- Scotland House was once again established for the Delhi Games. This was jointly planned and developed by a partnership of CGS with Glasgow 2014 Ltd, Glasgow City Council and Scottish Government and was led by Paul Bush and a support staff appointed by CGS. Scotland House provided a Scottish 'home from home' for the many supporters and team members in Delhi and was the focus of Team Scotland activity for formal and social functions and for media and sponsor activity. Activities culminated with a successful 'Handover' party celebrating Glasgow and Scotland becoming the next Games host.
- In parallel with the Delhi 2010 Games, CGS operated a new development programme called Achieve 2014 with support from **sportscotland**. This programme, led by Graeme Randall, provided a structured programme to allow up to two athletes and two coaches from the 17 Glasgow 2014 sports to experience key aspects of a Games environment under the direction of designated mentors. The programme's evaluation showed a strong impact on those attending which will stand them in good stead as they build towards selection for the 2014 Glasgow Commonwealth Games.
- For the first time, CGS supported individual sports to attend Commonwealth Championships with Scottish Rowing and Fencing both attending events with considerable success. Scottish Wrestling and Boxing also hosted successful Commonwealth junior and senior championships respectively.
- CGS has been an active supporter and contributed to organisation of the Commonwealth Sports Awards and Commonwealth Sport Development Conference when held in Scotland.

Planning, Research and Reporting

- Recommendations from the 2006 Debrief report were implemented where appropriate and changes to policies and procedures made.
- A review of preparations and outcomes of the 2010 Games was conducted by Alan Lynn of Stirling University with assistance from Craig Fail and Tony Stanger. This completed within six months of the 2010 Games. Athlete satisfaction with the Games preparations and management was again very high and a tribute to all those involved with the Team.
- The CGS strategic plan has been reviewed and updated and reported against as part of the Executive Board reporting process, at half yearly meetings with Council and AGMs.

Glasgow 2014 Ltd.

- Establishment of Glasgow 2014 Ltd. as the organising company for the 2014 Commonwealth Games with Jon Doig as an initial Director was replaced by Michael Cavanagh and Louise Martin as our two permanent Directors, along with Rhona Simpson as athlete's representative.
- Michael Cavanagh, as Chairman, represented CGS at the First Minister's Strategic Planning Group of Games partners (CGS, Scottish Government, Glasgow 2014 Ltd. and Glasgow City Council) which meets every two months to review Glasgow 2014 Games activity and Jon Doig represents CGS on the working group of lead officers which supports this group.
- Input has been given to the development and review of the Glasgow 2014 Business and Marketing plans and Risk Register.
- Assistance and direction has been given at Board and staff level to development of Glasgow plans, policies and operations focusing on key areas of Games Family Relations, Sport, Village, Venues, Marketing & Communications.
- Input is made on an ongoing basis to the Scottish Government's Games legacy programme planning, development and review.
- Input was given to the concept selection and management of the Games Handover programme that was successfully delivered at the Closing Ceremony of the 2010 Delhi Commonwealth Games.

Summary

Overall the 2007- 20011 period can again only be described as extremely successful for the Games movement in Scotland, both in and out of competition, with the 2008 and 2010 Team success providing an excellent base on which to prepare for the 2014 Games, confirmed during this time to be held in Glasgow. Winning the 2014 Glasgow Commonwealth Games was a major highlight that is already transforming Scottish sport and the Glasgow landscape, particularly in the East End. There will be challenges ahead as we look to obtain maximum benefit from hosting these Games that are occurring close on the back of the London Olympics, but the opportunities and potential rewards for sport and Scotland are immense.

I would like to finish by again acknowledging the many different individuals and organisations with, and for, whom we work. Our success in the last four years continues to build on long-term integrated planning and investment elsewhere in sport and our communities.

In particular, I would like to thank all the 2008 and 2010 Team staff and the outgoing CGS Board of Directors for their commitment and hard work to ensuring Team Scotland was not only successful, but continues to be an inspiration and credit to their country.

Finally, special thanks go to Michael, Vicky, Adrienne, Catherine and Todd for their roles in ensuring the base that is the CGS office keeps moving at all times, to deliver on behalf of our athletes and stakeholders.

HONORARY TREASURER



The figures attached show the financial summary of the four Commonwealth Games Scotland (CGS) accounting periods from 31/12/2006 to 31/12/2010, and demonstrate an extremely healthy financial position. A comparison of turnover with the previous four year period is also included, along with our current forecast for the next four years.

This strong financial position is due to our success in launching and supporting Scotland's Bid for the Commonwealth Games in 2014. The financial impact to date has been the £2m early payment for CGS marketing rights negotiated during the 2014 Bid process (with a final £1m payment due in 2012). On the other side of the coin, there has been a significant overall cost to CGS in supporting the many and varied activities of the Bid and Organising Committee.

The Commonwealth Games Scotland Endowment Fund and Commonwealth Games Scotland Youth Trust have continued to provide significant annual support, while we remain very grateful to **sportscotland** for their continued support towards our operating costs.

The key CGS expenditure features over this period have been the growth in operating costs due to a bigger staff, the increasing costs of Team Scotland activities at Games time, and the increased cost of supporting and preparing for Glasgow 2014 alongside our major stakeholders (including Scotland House activities and the Achieve 2014 Programme).

Over the last four years we have implemented new financial procedures; we have successfully implemented the SAGE automated book-keeping system; and we have negotiated a 'Partial Exemption Special Method' for the calculation of VAT input tax. We are most grateful for the expertise and support provided by both Gill Roberts and David Graham in these areas.

We have also instigated a full audit for the year to 31 December 2011.

Looking forward, the CGS long term financial plan has been adjusted to reflect regulatory pension changes in 2011; a slightly revised staffing structure; further CGS initiatives (including the Medallist Reward Scheme); and the various additional activities that will arise from a 'home' Games.

Our Joint Marketing Agreement with Glasgow 2014 means that CGS is not now able to generate sponsorship income until 2015, so our very healthy Balance Sheet at 31 December 2010 must be viewed with some caution. Nonetheless, our long term plan now forecasts a strong CGS financial position at the end of the forthcoming quadrennium that will provide a sound basis for CGS as it moves forward from the Glasgow 2014 Commonwealth Games to the three Games which quickly follow in 2015, 2017 and 2018.

GENERAL TEAM MANAGER



Overview

This is a combined report from the Chef de Mission and the General Team Manager of Team Scotland for Delhi 2010. It summarises the activities, issues and observations relating to the Delhi 2010 Games preparation and management. In particular, it outlines those aspects of the Team and Office preparation under the responsibility of the Chief Executive and CGS office staff.

The Commonwealth Games is the key multi-sport event that Scots want Scots to be successful in. The 2010 Games have been acknowledged by our athletes, management and external parties as being our most challenging of the modern era but were also amongst our most successful Games, both in terms of medals and in achievement of performance standards relative to the CGS Games Selection policy.

Key Success Factors

- Resources
 - Better resourced support programmes at national governing body and Institute/Area Institute levels.
 - Increased CGS staff support with staff stability.
 - Games experienced core of GTM, medical, and sport specific staff
 - Staff adaptability, commitment and hard work.
 - Additional financial support to the CGS via the endowment fund and utilisation of Glasgow 2014 resources endowment allowing the provision of extras, such as pre Games preparation trips to India.

- Training and Preparation
 - Training of staff via Team management training programme, media training and the Leadership Trust, Leadership in Management courses, focusing on India specific issues and incident management.
 - Pre-Games recce trips and individual sport pre-Games visits to India.
 - Structured CGS preparation, building on clear policies and procedures from past Games including a tougher selection policy.
- Partnerships
 - Increased partner support during the crisis point in the lead- up to the Games.
 - Partnership working with Institute and **sportscotland** programming.
 - Relationship building with Delhi 2010 and Team Scotland staff.
 - Development of links to the Metropolitan Police and other experts.
 - Partnership with Glasgow 2014, Glasgow City Council, Scottish Government and CGS Board, particularly during the soft opening period.
 - Close links with other CGAs pre and during Games.
- Team Ethos
 - Developed via staff engagement, strong communication vehicles, Team Camps and marketing.

Issues to Address Pre 2011/ 2014

- CGS administrative support structure and in particular reducing pressure six months pre-Games and during the Games.

- Addressing clothing issues to ensure better fitting clothing, delivered on time for 2011 and 2014.
- CGS selection policy review.
- Sports specific policies reviewed.
- Clarification of roles of CGS Board during Games.
- Countering the impact of Delhi on CG brand and overall CGA commitment to the Games.
- Role of CGF in monitoring Delhi (OC) preparations and their role up to and during Glasgow 2014.
- Further development of Scotland House.
- The future development of the Achieve 2014 programme.
- Further development of partnerships with Glasgow 2014, SGBs, **sportscotland**, Scottish Government and Glasgow City Council.
- The timing of the Glasgow 2014 Games and the impact on selection policies and operational areas.

During the period 2011-2014 there will be number of key developments in Scottish and UK Sport that will require a reassessment of our plans and priorities. Central amongst these are the outcome of the comprehensive spending review and the impact on Scottish and British sport spending in the lead up to the London Olympics and the 2014 Commonwealth Games. These changes will require us to reassess what type of support structure there will be for our Glasgow team and the ability to deliver an ongoing sporting legacy.

Also of critical importance to forward planning from Delhi is the timing of the Games in 2014. A July Games will require submission of entries of Team members by the start of June 2014 at the latest. This has a major impact on the whole athlete selection process and the logistical organisation such as clothing, travel, selection of support staff, and

marketing of the team. In addition the Games will have a number of home pressures we will not have faced for a long time. Learning from athlete and team management experience in London and the BOA will be important to our approach.

This will place a greater requirement on appointing and developing experienced staff in key positions and will require an even greater integration of operations and appointments between the 2011 Youth Games team and 2014 team.

All these factors will mean the success of Team Scotland at the next Games will be extremely hard to predict although being host and following Delhi, expectations will be extremely high. This will have to be very carefully managed.

AQUATICS



It was always going to be difficult for the swimmers to match their truly exceptional performance of the 2006 Games, where they won a historic 12 medals. However determined to deliver to their potential they didn't disappoint and won two gold, three silver and a bronze in the swimming plus a first ever medal in the synchronised swimming which was also bronze.

This resulted in aquatics achieving their medal target of seven: five swimming medals, one disability swimming medal and one medal from either diving or synchronised swimming. The target was set one year prior to the Games and was based on securing a high percentage of the total 'medal opportunities'. This reflected a medal target equal to Scotland's best performance in the pool with exception of Melbourne.

On thorough examination of the results, a low number of swims were lifetime bests (11%) and national records were set only in relay swims. However, the meet itself was slow in general and it was clear, following the removal of high-tech suits and in the tough environment that Delhi presented, that the meet was primarily about racing. Scotland finished 5th on the medal table in the pool and overall the performance of Scottish swimmers is considered very positive. A 4th place medal table finish is being targeted for 2014.

Swimming

The action got underway at Dr SP Mukherjee Swimming Complex on the first day of the Games with David Carry out to defend his 400m freestyle title. He had to settle for bronze but still collected Scotland's first medal of the Games.

Day two saw David back in action along with fellow Aberdonian Robbie Renwick in the 200m freestyle. This time it was Robbie's turn to come out on top and win Scotland's first gold and hear the Flower of Scotland played on the podium for the very first time.

On day three with both Renwick and Carry keen to add to their personal medal tally, they teamed up with Andy Hunter and Jak Scott in the men's 4x200m freestyle relay to take silver in the final. Cameron Brodie and Lewis Smith also were awarded medals for their contribution in the heats.

It was Sean Fraser's turn to stand on the medal podium on day five, after powering to silver in the 100m freestyle Para Sport S8 event.

On the final day of competition in the pool Michael Jamieson took silver in the 200m breaststroke touched out to miss gold by 0.08 seconds. European Champion Hannah Miley had had to wait all week to compete in her favoured 400m individual medley. She held her nerve to take gold in style with a time of 4:38.83, a new Commonwealth Games Record and crowned a fantastic meet for Team Scotland.

Synchronised Swimming

After the first day of the Synchronised Swimming competition, Scotland's Lauren Smith was lying in third place following strong execution of her technical routine. She put in a superb performance in the free routine the following day to secure bronze, Scotland's first ever synchro medal.

Diving

14 year old Grace Reid was Scotland's sole representative in the diving, following the withdrawal of the Galashan twins with Helen sustaining a fractured wrist just days before departing for Delhi. Grace who was Scotland's youngest ever team, made her Games debut in the 3m springboard diving event. She dived steadily and qualified for the final where she finish sixth, settings a new pb in the process and the first time a British junior diver has ever scored over 300 points.

ARCHERY



Archery made a return to the Commonwealth Games arena in Delhi for the first time since Brisbane in 1982. Team Scotland had 10 archers selected for the Games in both compound and recurve disciplines.

In the team competition the men's recurve and compound teams both finished 9th, whilst the women's compound team were 8th. There were mixed fortunes for the archers in the individual events with Tracey McGowan giving the best Scottish performance to finish 6th overall.

It is disappointing for Archery that it will not be included in the next Games in Glasgow in 2014. Scottish Archery believes that the CGF should try to ensure that any sport included in the Games remains in for at least the next Games (i.e. two consecutive Games). The amount of work and preparation for a new sport coming to the Games is immense and so is the learning; it is also accepted that most athletes perform better at their second Games; for both these reasons the returns to a sport and individual Games Associations would be greater.

Similarly it is suggested that there should be greater competition opportunities provided for Commonwealth sports not included in a particular Games to allow the standard to be maintained and developed and to provide a shop window for countries bidding for future Games, so they can better judge the popularity (and vote winning potential) of optional sports on the programme.

ATHLETICS



At the impressive Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium there were mixed performances from the Scots and it was the women that came out on top contributing a silver and a bronze to the team's medal tally.

On day 5 Steph Twell, representing Scotland for the first time, had a magnificent race in the 1500m against world class opposition. She dug deep and held her line on the inside of the track to take a well earned bronze. Later in the week she gave another fine performance in the 5000m and just missed out on the medals finishing 4th .

On day 7 Eilidh Child went into the final of the 400m hurdles as second fastest from the heats and lived up to her billing. She ran a fantastic race to clinch the silver medal in a time of 55.62 to end a successful season which saw her step up and establish herself amongst world class competition.

Double Commonwealth Games medallist Lee McConnell finished 4th and 5th in the 400m and 200m respectively and was also part of the women's 4x400m relay team which finished 5th. Freya Murray also finished 5th in the 10,000m.

There was disappointment however for the men in the throws events, having been well placed going into the competition. In the hammer, Andy Frost came away disappointed with a 4th place finish whilst Mark Dry was 6th and James Campbell also had to settle for 6th in the javelin.

BADMINTON



In the mixed team competition Scotland got off to a winning start, first against Barbados then Wales and Kenya, all to the same impressive 5-0 score line. Hosts India were the first to beat the Scots 4-1. It was then Scotland's turn to face the Auld Enemy England in the quarter finals where they lost 3-1 and with it their chance of winning a team medal as they had in Manchester in 2002.

In the individual events it was Glasgow's Susan Egelstaff that led the charge for Scotland in the women's singles. However Scotland's hopes of ending the badminton competition with a medal ended in disappointment when third seed Susan Egelstaff lost the bronze medal play-off to great rival and fourth seed Elizabeth Cann of England.

Egelstaff had been hoping to repeat her victory of four years ago over the England No. 1 at the same stage in Melbourne and she went into action boosted by a 21-12 21-17 win over Cann in the quarter-finals of the team event. However after taking an early lead in the first game she lost 21-18, 21-16.

Watson Briggs and Imogen Bankier also performed well giving silver medallists and top seeds Nathan Robertson and Jennifer Wallwork of England a scare in the mixed doubles quarter-finals. They were 19-14 up in the first game and 18-16 up in the second but ultimately lost out 22-20 23-21.

Briggs also narrowly missed out on a place in the semi finals of the men's doubles with Paul van Rietvelde when they were beaten by Singapore's Hendri Kurniawan and Hendra Wijaya 21-11 22-20.

17 year old Kirsty Gilmour played beyond her years in both team and individual events reaching last 16 in the women's singles which was an excellent achievement.

Whilst there were some good results and performances by Scottish players at the Delhi

Games, ultimately the target was to win a medal and this was not met. With the exception of Susan Egelstaff the squad were aged between 17 and 24. Badminton Scotland will now work with CGS and other stakeholders with this young and talented group of players to ensure they achieve their targets in Glasgow in 2014.

BOXING



There was a great buzz in the boxing camp from the off, with all seven boxers determined to show what they could do. They didn't disappoint and came away with a bronze, silver and gold to maintain boxing's incredible record of a medal at every Commonwealth Games.

In his opening bout of the competition Stephen Simmons in the 91kg Heavyweight category was up against South African Masana Manganyi and gave a dominant performance to win 10-2. In the quarter finals there was another confident win for Simmons 7-4 against Canadian Samir El Mais. But there was disappointment in the semis when he lost 6-1 to Northern Ireland's Steven Ward and had to settle for bronze.

Josh Taylor started strongly in the 60kg Lightweight category defeating Melbourne bronze medallist, Darren Edwards of Wales 5-1. He gave another winning performance 4-1 against Benjamin Lamptey of Ghana, before conducting a whitewash against Kautoa Roddy of Kiribati in the quarter finals to win 10-0 and guarantee himself a medal. In the semi-finals Josh put in a composed performance to beat Tongan Lomalito Moala 5-0, but in the final it was a tough ask when he was up against England's Thomas Stalker, current European Champion. The experience of the Englishman showed as he came out on top 11-3 and a bitterly disappointed Taylor had to make do with silver. However it was an outstanding result for the 19 year old from Edinburgh who had only conceded two points on his way to the final.

It was Callum Johnson in the 81kg Light Heavyweight category that went all the way and took gold, a repeat of the feat performed by Kenny Anderson in Melbourne four years earlier. Having seen off Krystian Borucki of the Isle of Man 8-1 in his opening bout, Johnson was up against Englishman Obed Mbwakongo in the quarter finals and came out on top 6-2. In the semis Johnson continued to show his dominance against Wales'

Jermaine Asare forcing the referee to stop the contest at 11-1. There was no stopping Callum now as he executed a clinical performance from the start of his final against Thomas McCarthy of Northern Ireland 8-1 to take gold and secure Team Scotland's final gold medal of the Games.

CYCLING



After the six medal haul for Scotland in Melbourne on the track there was some disappointment this year in the velodrome, with just one silver medal to celebrate. However it was a different story in the road events where David Millar was determined to do Scotland proud and won a bronze and a gold.

On the first day of the cycling competition, Jenny Davis and Charline Joiner won silver in the women's team sprint, a new event on the Commonwealth Games programme. Having only trained together for this event for a few months it was a fabulous achievement.

But there was heartache for the Team Scotland flag bearer, Ross Edgar, who crashed out of the keirin following a collision in the semi final stages and was unable to bounce back in the individual sprint with the toughest possible draw against Australia's Shane Perkins in the quarter final. Perkins beat Edgar in two straight rides on his way to winning the gold medal.

For David Millar, Delhi was where his dreams of winning Commonwealth Games medals for Scotland came true. After a fabulous tactical battle in the road race which Millar controlled for much of the second half, he was outsprinted at the finish to take an excellent bronze. With a full complement of six Team Scotland riders in the race, Millar was well supported, and he paid tribute at the finish to the work done by David Lines, James McCallum and Ross Creber, Evan Oliphant and Andy Fenn in the 168km race held in 41-degree heat.

After his bronze in Sunday's road race, Millar was the favourite going into the 40km time trial, which was made challenging by strong wind. The race was held on an expressway on the outskirts of Delhi, with a tailwind-assisted first 20km before the riders had to turn and ride directly into the wind. Yet as others struggled along the flat course, Millar was a model of efficiency. After leading England's Alex Dowsett at

half-distance - by just four seconds - his margin of victory was a whopping 54 seconds on the line. For the second time in a week David Millar made history, becoming the first Scot ever to win a gold medal in a road cycling event and it was presented to him by Scotland's First Minister Alex Salmond.

Overall the women's hockey team finished 7th as per their Commonwealth Ranking, but were disappointed not to be two places higher.

The men had a disappointing campaign and lost all four pool games against Pakistan, Australia, Malaysia and India to finish bottom of pool A. In the play-offs they beat Trinidad & Tobago to finish 9th overall and equal their seeding.

Scotland men were in the far stronger section as displayed by the fact that both teams in the final were from pool A. However it was a wonderful experience, displayed the best of international hockey, (7 of the top 10 teams in the world were there) and proved to be an excellent tournament. This is one of the sports where the Commonwealth Games are truly world class event.

RUGBY 7s



Scotland created history as they made it into the quarter finals of the rugby sevens competition for the first time at the Commonwealth Games.

They opened proceedings with a 26-0 victory over Guyana then faced a tough match against Canada and came out on top 19-17. Their final pool match was against the almighty All Blacks who had stood out all day with their speed and skill. Scotland went down 44-0 but were pleased to go through as second in their group.

On day two Scotland faced South Africa, and having beaten them at Murrayfield in the IRB World Sevens Series in June, they hoped they could produce a repeat performance. It wasn't to be and in a closely fought contest they lost 10-7. They quickly picked themselves up and overcame a strong Kenyan side after extra time in the semi-final of the plate winning 22-17. The final showdown was against reigning IRB Series Champions Samoa, who dominated the match winning 34-0 to lift the plate.

Scotland ended their most successful ever Commonwealth Games campaign in sixth position.

Scottish Rugby recognises that the focus must now be on winning medals in 2014 and that increased resources are needed to achieve this.

SHOOTING



Scotland's shooters were on target in Delhi and finished as the top sport at the Games winning four gold, three silver and two bronze. It was also their most successful Commonwealth Games performance ever.

In the 50m small bore rifle events Jen McIntosh and Kay Copland started the medal haul winning bronze in the 50m rifle 3 position pairs competition which was soon matched by Jon Hammond and Neil Stirton. Jon then went on to win silver in the individual 3 position event.

But it was in the 50m rifle prone events that Scotland swept the board with the above quartet winning an incredible four gold medals in the men's and women's pairs and individual competitions, an outstanding achievement and one that made coach and father Donald McIntosh extremely proud.

Jen put in an exemplary performance to take the gold only dropping three points during the entire match to equal the world record, and set a new Commonwealth Games record of 597-42x. This medal has a particular significance to Jen, whose mother Shirley won the event at the 1994 Games in Victoria.

Jon Hammond with two gold, a silver and a bronze was the athlete of the Games and the most successful male athlete ever at a single Games for Scotland, whilst Jen McIntosh with two gold and a bronze was the most successful female athlete ever at a single Games.

Keen to contribute to the medal tally, the other shooting disciplines did not disappoint. For the clay target shooters it was Shona Marshall in the individual trap event that came up trumps and won silver and in full bore Angus McLeod and Ian Shaw also delivered a hard earned silver in the pairs competition, which was fraught with technical difficulties on the range.

It was in the doubles events that Scotland hoped to shine at the Siri Fort Sports Complex. The team had targeted and been selected for the doubles competitions but the players were also entered in their respective singles competitions where some of the best players in the world dominated.

At the same time, all selected players reached at least one quarter-final and two players reached the semi-finals before losing the playoff for bronze.

Lyall Paterson and Chris Small and Lisa Aitken and Frania Gillen-Buchert progressed from the group stages of the men's and women's doubles respectively, but both pairs lost out in the quarter finals.

Similarly mixed doubles pair Lisa Aitken and Harry Leitch also made it through their group with an outstanding win against the number 3 seeds and eventual bronze medallists, Malaysia's Nicol David (singles gold medallist, women's world champion and world number 1) and Ong Beng Hee (world number 17); and then went out in the quarter finals.

It was left to men's doubles pairing of Harry Leitch and Alan Clyne to fly the flag for Scotland and they battled all the way to the semi finals comprehensively defeating the No.3 seeds, England's Daryl Selby (world No.8) and Peter Barker (world No.9) in the quarter finals. The semi final was a match of extraordinary doubles which lasted an hour and 24 minutes the Scots went out 11/10 11/6 to Australian opponents – Palmer and Boswell.

This gave the Scottish pair one final shot at bronze and again they faced Australian opposition in the play-off in the form of Ryan Cuskelly and Cameron Pilley.

After a tight affair in the first game and a fight back in the second, there was disappointment when they were beaten 11/5 11/7 to just miss out on a medal.

The Scottish trio of Gavin Rungay, Craig Howieson and Stewart Crawford started their Games campaign in the team competition. They won two out of three group games beating Uganda and Kenya before losing to Nigeria. They faced Malaysia and lost 1-3 in the last 16 to miss out on the quarter finals. Left to contest the minor team placings, they persevered to beat Sri Lanka then Canada to finish ninth, short of their seventh place ranking going into the competition.

In the singles, Gavin was Scotland's top player reaching the last 16 where he lost to the Indian second seed and eventual bronze medallist with a world ranking of 40 compared to Gavin's 228. Craig qualified for the singles, but went out in the second round (last 32) to the eventual fourth placed player, whilst Stewart just failed to make it through the qualifying round to the last 64.

The singles competition was dominated by Singapore and India with seven players finishing in the top eight.

Gavin and Craig got through to the last 16 of the men's doubles but lost by 0-3 to a strong Australian pair who went on to finish fourth.

Tennis was making its Games debut in Delhi and the players were determined to make their involvement count, despite the late withdrawal of Elena Baltacha who was a strong prospect in the women's singles.

It was the mixed doubles pairing of Colin Fleming and Jocelyn Rae that took the tournament by storm, beating the hosts and second seeds India and fourth seeds England in the semi-finals, on the way to clinching gold in a nail biting final that had all the Scottish supporters on the edge of their seats.

The unseeded Scottish pair, who had never played together before the Games, completed a truly remarkable fight-back in the final to beat the Australian top seeds Paul Hanley and Anastasia Rodionova 7-6 6-7 6-2 to become the first ever mixed doubles tennis champions in Commonwealth Games competition. Their outstanding achievement secured Scotland's third gold medal of the Games and met the sport's challenging, revised medal target of one.

WEIGHTLIFTING



Fourteen men contested the 94kg category including Kilmarnock's very own Peter Kirkbride who jumped for joy when he was awarded the silver medal, breaking two records on the way.

The reigning British Champion and holder of three Scottish and British records before competition was looking to add a medal to his accolades.

Going into the snatch at 140kg, 5kg heavier than originally intended, Peter shook off his nerves and had a 'good lift'. 144kg was the next challenge which he lifted comfortably, but 146kg was just out of reach.

Kirkbride, who competed four years ago in Melbourne finishing 6th, and claimed gold at the 2004 Commonwealth Youth Games, was lying second going into the Clean & Jerk discipline.

He started with 182kg, moving him into the lead; maintained that with a 186kg second lift and went for 189kg in his final attempt and made it look easy giving him a combined total of 333kg.

He jumped for joy as he left the podium and waited anxiously for the final two opponents to challenge him. But when gold looked all but his, Faauliuli of Samoa, in the last lift of the competition, successfully lifted 192kg to grab the gold by a single kilogram.

Nevertheless, Peter and his long-time coach Charles (Chick) Hamilton were delighted with silver and proud to win Scotland's eleventh medal of the Games.

Veteran weightlifter and Commonwealth Games multi-medallist Tommy Yule finished in 6th whilst Graeme Kane making his Games debut finished in 9th.

The 3rd Commonwealth Youth Games were held in Pune, India from 12th to 18th October 2008 and were the first Youth Games to include teams from all 71 Commonwealth countries.

Scotland was represented by a team of 44 athletes which was the number limited by organisers. This compares to 69 in 2004, 88 in 2000. In both the 2004 and 2000 Youth Games there was a team sport; Rugby Sevens in 2004 and Hockey in 2000.

Scottish Results Overview

The final medal tally was 18 medals made up of 3 Gold, 3 Silver and 12 Bronze. Scotland finished 8th on medal table in which 33 different countries won medals. We place 6th in 2000 where 10 countries won medals and 4th in 2004 where 18 won medals. We won medals in 6 sports out of the 8 sports that we competed in.

I was absolutely delighted with our athlete's performances, not just those that won medals and achieved personal bests, but with the whole team for the way they bonded together and supported each other. What the athletes learnt in Pune will undoubtedly stand them in good stead for when they are seniors competing in future Games.

- Commonwealth Games Scotland (CGS) and the next Youth Games General Team Management (GTM) must ensure that the Youth Games remain focused on athletes and staff gaining experience at a multi-sport Games, to help increase the chances of success at a senior level, and are not just about winning Youth Games medals. There should be no comparisons from one Youth Games to the next as the number of countries competing does not remain constant, the sports programmes also differ and the events within the sports programmes are not the same.

Operational Summary

A full report has been submitted to the CGS office which takes account of the views of the all GTM, medical and sports specific team staff members. In summary the following common recommendations are made covering all key area of the Youth Games operation.

Team Staff

The staff all did an excellent job in very difficult circumstances, enabling athletes to focus on their

competitions. The knowledge of the staff varied from inexperienced and first time at a multi-sport event to extremely qualified. Whilst we fully support the rationale that the Youth Games is an ideal opportunity for new or inexperienced staff to be given development opportunities, the nature of the host country should determine the required experience of the GTM and medical staff.

- The GTM had to assist those sports with only a coaching position. Care needs to be taken to identify high staff use sports and appoint staff appropriately.
- The staff structure should be based on the potential maximum athlete numbers, the sports on the programme, gender balance and the host country.
- All staff positions should be formally recruited with clear job descriptions including Sport Team Leaders (STLs), who must be appointed well in advance of the selection period.
- A staff member with IT experience would be extremely useful.
- It is essential that the Chairman/Special Envoy role continues and remains outwith the Village to manage VIPs.

Administration and Policies

The administration workload for the Youth Games was large and required close working between the CGS office and GTM. The policies in place stood us in good stead.

- All GTM and medical staff to be given training in Zeus appropriate to their level of access with more than one CGS staff member being Zeus trained to provide support.
- Staff training should be provided specific to needs and linked to information giving and a social event.
- All policies and processes should be reviewed and if necessary updated prior to next Youth Games.
- Sport specific policies should be written, signed off and published as a collective well before the selection period opens.
- Sport specific policies for weight control sports need to contain processes to deal with an athlete's inability to make the weight they have been selected for.

- In addition to the STL identify a key sports governing body (SGB) person for CGS to communicate with and CGS to send a comprehensive timeline of dates for SGB specific actions.
- Consider a policy/agreement for sports regarding the management of free time.

Media

Having a designated media person to co-ordinate results, press releases and photographs proved invaluable and took a lot of pressure off the other GTM staff. These Games gave a great opportunity to profile our athletes of the future and prepare them for future levels of media attention.

- The Countdown newsletters and team handbook were really well received and content was appropriate and useful, however athlete biographical information for 2011 and beyond should be extracted from Zeus to saving asking athletes twice.
- Use group texts for communication of results.
- The media training was very good and more media training for the athletes would be beneficial.

Sport Specific

Sports need to give their athletes as much information as possible on competing in the environment they are going to. This should not be in conflict and should be submitted to CGS to ensure that the messages are consistent.

Recce

These were invaluable in planning for the Games and managing expectations. Our recces ensured our team was the best prepared and located.

- Plan an appropriate number of recces depending on host country.
- Identify the best accommodation and bid for it as early as possible.
- Identify distances from village to venues.
- Share information and any video footage on return.
- Use the recce to identify the appropriate size of the advance staff party.

Team Camps

The Team Camps proved invaluable as a way of educating athletes, staff and parents prior to departure and building a Team Scotland ethos.

- Repeat both team camps at the appropriate times for 2011.
- Incorporate into the final Team camp programme more time for athletes to interact.

Travel

The challenges will vary according to the Games host country and the sports in the programme. Our strong working relationship with Emirates Airline ensured all the team arrived in the best possible shape to compete.

- When flying, a specific area needs to be set aside at the airport for the team to gather.
- Good relationships must continue with the airline and airports at both ends of the journey with dedicated airline staff and check-in desks allocated.

Clothing

Our competition and leisure clothing provided by Kukri was striking and well received.

- Buy kit in generic sizes (small, medium, large etc.) rather than male and female sizes
- Clarify early with each sport exactly what they need and do not need. In terms of competition kit CGS to supply everything or nothing.
- Order extra clothing to allow for Youth Games team changing size.

At the Games

There were a number of organisational issues resulting from a lack of preparation by Games organisers.

- Establish competency of liaison officers at first meeting.
- Future GTM to ensure that meetings are held each day irrespective of timings. Implementing recommendations under staffing to overcome issues of sports with one member off staff.
- Future GTM to ensure they attend all daily meetings even if they start before the team arrives.

- Team to arrive early enough to ensure that all technical meetings are attended by the sport specific staff.
- Check arrangements for mobile phone networks and local SIM cards and internet access. Supply mobile broadband if necessary.

Medical

India was an environment few of our athletes and staff had competed in and there were some health related issues which were raised and dealt with effectively by our medical team. There was a focus on pre-Games check-ups and personal hygiene with extensive briefings given. This resulted in a very low incidence of illness enabling athletes to compete.

- Medical information gaps need to be filled earlier by team members filling in mandatory forms.
- A better knowledge of medical provision needs to be given to those sports with less understanding.
- Identify physiotherapists to work with the sport early on so as to build good relationships and communication.
- Take sufficient supplies of own snacks if unlikely to be provided.

The 2008 Scottish Commonwealth Youth Games Team would like to thank the CGS Chairman, Board and staff, the Scottish Government, sportscotland, and official partners and Hutchins High School. We would also like to recognise all the team supporters for their enthusiasm and assistance, especially those who travelled to India. They provided excellent support and encouragement at events for the team which was second only to that for the host nation.
